TREASURER'S REPORT

Dear Club members,

I have the privilege to present the Financial Year 2019 (FY19) Financial Statement for the Warringah Rugby Club. This year, we have engaged the accountants at Morton O'Leary to review the attached financial reports.

FY19 has been a turning point for the club from a financial reporting perspective; we made sweeping changes to our financial reporting structure and validated key financial items to enable the Board and Administration to better track and manage our various key commitments.

WRC's FY19 financial performance returned a loss of (\$201,400). Whilst this is a disappointing result, it reflects weaker business conditions as well as our commitment to being decisive in dealing with outstanding financial and operational issues.

The results included 2 notable components;

\$77,577 from expenses relating to prior period. Despite the best endeavours of prior year's Administration to appropriately account for all payables, prior years' outstanding payables contributed to 39% of the loss incurred for this financial year. These expenses have been brought to account and described as a prior period statement in the Profit and Loss statement.

\$22,000 from write off of non-current asset balances as a result of our balance sheet validation. This write off is reflected within the depreciation account in the Profit and Loss Statement.

Excluding the above notable components, our underlying financial loss for our 4 key operating segments is \$103,710.

• **Administration**

We continue to rely on our sponsorship revenue to cover the majority of the fixed costs, particularly during the off season.

Lower sponsorship income in FY19 (-21% vs FY18) together with higher admin costs have put a significant strain in our finances. Higher admin costs were largely driven by the increased responsibilities from the continued growth of our full time rugby development commitments.

• **Club Operations**

Higher marketing costs and new council related invoices from this segment contributed to the overall unprofitability of WRC.

This is partially offset by support from Friends of Warringah (FOW), which has enabled us refresh the gym equipment, 7s program, junior development, and Green and White Academy.

• **Rugby Expenses**

Warringah's on field success can be attributable to the significant investment in players and coaching development throughout 2019. Whilst these costs have increased this year, the Board is committed to continue investing in this area in the coming years to develop talent and grow the sport.

Another year of on field success translated into higher home game patronage and revenue in 2019. The continued refinement of our game day reporting also enabled the Administration to optimise the efficiency of our activities in these areas.

To conclude the financial briefing, changes to the financial reporting structure will assist us in establishing avenues where efficiencies can be achieved in order to return to surplus for FY20.

GENERAL MANAGER'S REPORT

For our wonderful group of male and female footballers, what an incredibly exciting and successful season. Excitement and success not only continued from 2017 and 2018, but also shared by every family member, supporter and sponsor. Three of the Club's four grade sides made the semi-finals and two of the Club's three Colts sides also made the semi-finals. The importance of our Colts' success can not be overestimated or appreciated. Along with our village clubs and State Representative teams, the Colts are our building blocks of future success, and many years of dedicated hard work by many people in building our Colts program is coming to fruition. Further, the Colts could not have had a better mentor or coach guiding them this season in Sailosi Tagicakibau. We are most grateful that Sailosi will continue on in his role as Colts Head Coach in 2020. Who knows, he may even score the winning try again against Manly next season again as well!!

Of course, it would be remiss not to mention the outstanding results of our Shute Shield 1st Grade side. The season was full of incredible highlights, brought to you on social media each week, thanks to the wonderful contribution of Friends of Warringah who help fund our advancement in game day filming and in-depth analysis. Before a ball was kicked in anger, injuries were hitting the entire club hard, and in general it would be fair to say it never really relinquished its grip on us. Despite that, every grade contributed to a season that, under Head Coach Mark Gerrard, saw 1st Grade achieve 9 wins straight (a Club record), 6 consecutive weeks at the top of the Shute Shield ladder (a club record), hold the Sir Roden Cutler Shield for the entire season, an unbelievable 1 point win over Sydney University here at Rat Park, an incredible after the siren victory over Eastwood at Eastwood, an exciting Bayfield Cup victory again at Rat Park over Manly, capping off a come from behind win over Manly at Manly earlier in the year. All of this culminated in a 3rd consecutive Grand Final, where this outstanding group of men outplayed the greatest Club in Shute Shield history, leading for 71 of the 80 minutes and only just missing out on a thoroughly deserved win. That said, our unbelievable supporters and sponsors were back at the Club after the game making it such a celebratory atmosphere. Every player felt victorious. And they were.

This exciting season led to some very encouraging results off the field as well. Total Game Day Revenue in 2019 was \$468,964 against \$398,649 in 2018, representing a \$70,315 increase or 17.6% growth. Whilst the Home Final against Norths was a welcome addition to our regular home games revenue, it did not reach the heights in terms of revenue generation compared to the Home Final of 2018 which was against Manly. However, the Norths Home Final drew a TV audience of 80,000, as did the semi-final against Eastwood. The Grand Final drew a TV audience of 100,000. Game Day Other costs also declined from \$24,017 in 2018 to \$16,910 in 2019. Game Day Entertainment costs declined from \$21,445 in 2018 to \$10,568. Interestingly, whilst game Day revenue increased, primarily through increased beverage sales, beverage purchases declined by approximately \$4,000. The new Steve "Bundy" Temple Can Bar was an outstanding success. It was definitely a risk to undertake replacing the previous structure during the season and had the potential to backfire. However, the outstanding co-operation and support of Northern Beaches Council (NBC) ensured that we closed the previous bar after one home game and had the new bar operational by the very next home game. This seamless transition could not have been achieved without NBC. The levelling of the ground and a new platform in front of the Can Bar has already been completed ensuring that it is an even better facility for our members and supporters who dominate the Hill. The faster we can get drinks to the wonderful Hillbillies, the better it is for our teams on the field!!

There are a lot of people who go to making an outstanding year. And every year, without fail, our wonderful group of volunteers play a major part. I can not only express my deepest thanks for their support of not only myself from day 1 when I began in February, but also their constant and unwavering support of WRC and our players. To the Volunteers, please know that your contributions are not only recognised by everyone, but greatly appreciated. We can't be the benchmark that we are, that every other Club strives to be, without what you do.

I want to also acknowledge to our broader community the Club's thanks to each and every sponsor. The sponsor's have heard me say this, I hope, but it is something that can easily be forgotten. Without their extremely generous financial support, this Club would not only not be able to put up to 9 teams on the field every weekend, but we would not achieve the success, or provide the support we currently do, without them. Further, what separates our sponsors from any and every other club, is their true and unwavering support of every player that puts on a WRC jersey. They ride every emotion that our players do. They feel every disappointment and ride every high with them. Our players happiness and their successes are personal to every sponsor. It is truly unique to WRC.

2ND GRADE REPORT

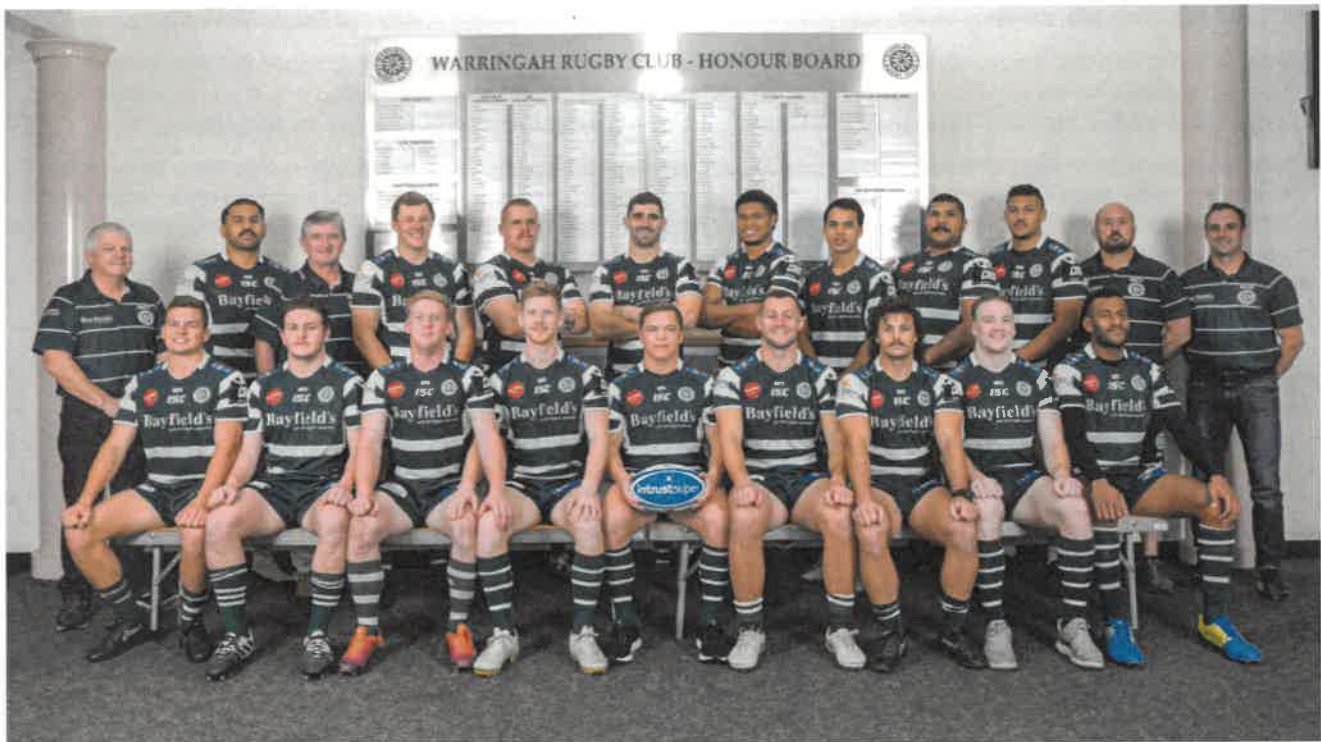
Greg Highfield – 2nd Grade Head Coach

2019 4th Grade Season Report

Coming off the back of a premiership-winning season was always going to make 2019 an interesting year. On one hand, there were many returning with pride from what had been achieved and a steely desire to work hard towards a back-to-back title with whoever wanted to come along for the ride. On the other hand, the club had an influx of new faces, a handful of experienced stalwarts return to the fold and a solid group of talented colts graduate into grade and everyone was keen for some action. So while some of the old soldiers were ready for a second tour, it was clear it wasn't going to be the same team. However, the new melting pot of players made for a very strong, competent and competitive lower grade playing group. Once again, all the players aspired to improve and play as high a grade as they could right throughout the season and their growth and development on and off the field, especially with the younger players, was assisted by a group of selfless senior players – you know who you are!

As most 4th Grade coaches would attest, it's an environment that can be both fickle and volatile with the hope of stability and continuity somewhat of a pipe dream – but that's the nature of the beast and we simply got on with it. The success we did enjoy was testament to the special group of players who worked hard each week to add as much consistency and value to the mix as possible. As a club, we were incredibly fortunate to be blessed with very healthy player numbers, but that blessing can also be curse. We had well in excess of 70 players come through the lower grades and regularly had close to 50 players fighting for 25 positions in 4th Grade each week. Luckily for us, a small group of clubs including Manly, Easts and Gordon coordinated 5th grade games as often as possible when we weren't playing each other. I am extremely grateful to the coordinators in those clubs (they know who they are) who simply wanted the same as we did. Those 5th Grade games gave new and aspiring players the opportunity to showcase their wares, keep players sharp, keep the competition healthy, not to mention provide additional depth to our club's playing ranks, but most importantly it kept players playing. Mutual benefits aside, this week-to-week arrangement reaffirmed the true spirit of rugby still exists across parts of Sydney Premiership Rugby and trying to get as many players on the field as possible is still the ultimate end game.

Although we fell one game short of making the big dance, we finished the minor premiership in second place with 12 wins and 5 losses. It was quite a bumpy ride along the way but another successful year nonetheless. We had two solid wins to start the season against Norths and Easts and then a disappointing loss to Sydney Uni. We jumped back on the horse for another couple of wins and then another loss followed – an unfortunate pattern was beginning to emerge. The ebbs and flows continued but eventually ended towards the business end of the season with five successive wins leading into the finals, including a very satisfying victory against the eventual premiers Sydney Uni.

The squad's performance in the preliminary final against Randwick was outstanding, probably one of the finest performances the team had. Both confidence and spirits were high, our preparation was positive and we had a very solid side. Unfortunately we couldn't quite get all the ducks in a row in our re-match against Sydney Uni during the semi final. Despite going into the break with a small 8-10 deficit, they got the better of us in the second half and it simply wasn't our day. Naturally it was extremely disappointing for all of us having got so close and that disappointment was clearly visible, which showed how much we all cared. But that's life and the nature of sport – you win some, you lose some – but we keep rolling forward.

To all the players involved in the 4/5 playing group this year, thank you for your commitment, patience and passion for the club. Your efforts could not be questioned, the team spirit and camaraderie that was forged is a credit to all of you.

There are four very important acknowledgements that must be made: to my assistant coach, Hamish Finch whose insight and read on each weekly game was invaluable. Makayla Finch, our team manager whose organisational skills, precision and diligence had the team's back office running like clockwork. 4TH GRADE REPORT CONTINUED

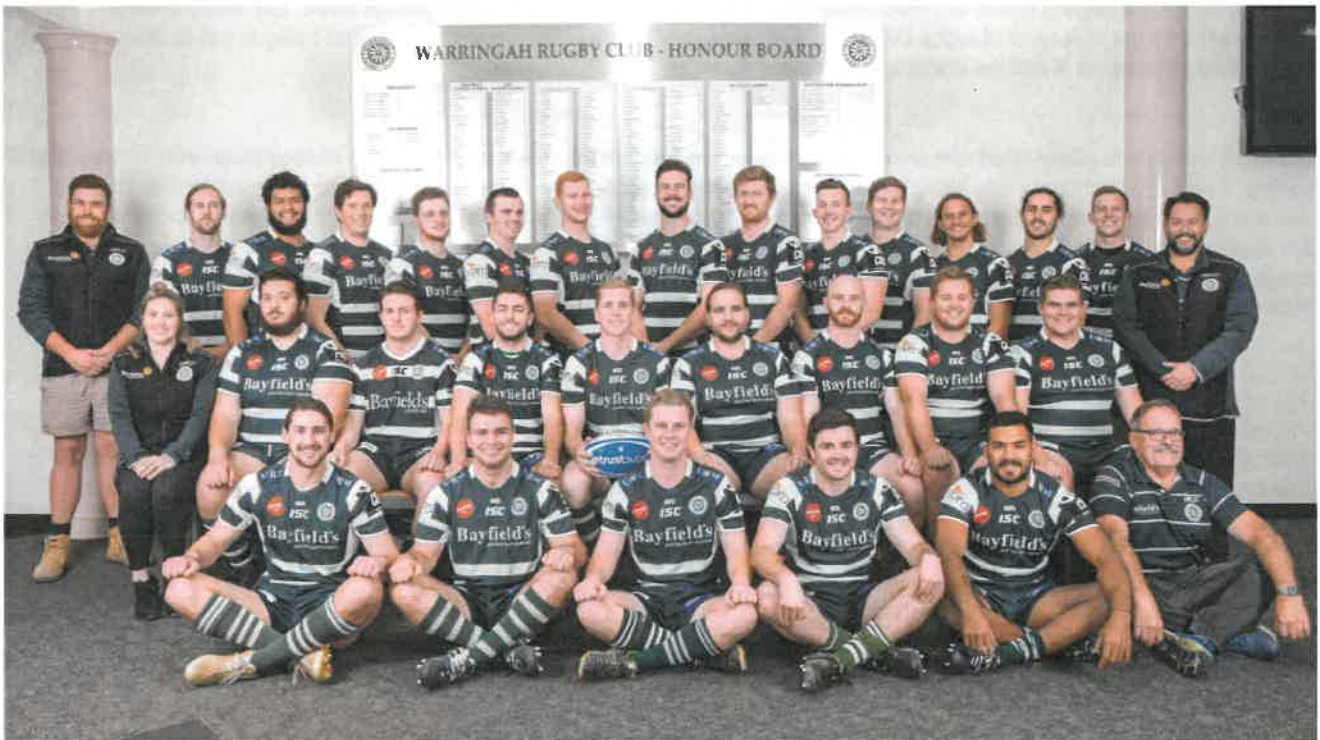


Greg Lee, 4th Grade Head Coach

Sailosi was assisted in coaching first grade colts by Mike Ross. Scott Ritchie coached 2nd grade colts and Turbo joined him mid way through the season. Murray Hooper and Craig Roberts coached 3rd grade colts which was at time a large group of 30 players. Ben Bidencope joined as the colts strength and conditioning coach with Bernie Chau as physio.

Pre season started with an under 20s Sevens tournament in Maitland. The boys played well but were unlucky to lose in the quarters. Pre season training started in November at Rat Park with grade and was well attended. When pre season returned after Christmas colts trained at Narrabeen Sports High. Numbers were strong and this continued throughout the pre season. Ben had the players fitness increasing whilst the coaches continued to work on the skills.

Some of the players competed with grade players in the Sevens tournaments in February with good results.

Unfortunately the under 18s competition folded a few days before it was to begin so the players who had been training with the colts for the under 18s team now formed part of 3rd grade colts.

The season started in April and colts had a tough start with 4 big games against Norths, then Easts followed by Sydney Uni and Gordon, all teams that finished in the semis last season. Round 1 against Norths at Rat Park saw a win in 1sts and 3rds and a narrow loss in 2nds, a positive start to the season. Of the 9 players, 6 were selected with Ben Bryden and Matt Graham being selected in the Under 19 URC Sydney team, Conor Hickey, Caleb Hopping and Jacob Rabai being selected in the Under 19 URC Country team and Josh Roberts in the Under 19 URC Barbarian team. Congratulations to those boys for their selections.

The season wrapped up with presentation night. Congratulations to Ben Bryden for top try scorer, Jeremy Allen top point scorer, Unga Latu best and fairest 3rd colts player, George Kanongataa best and fairest 2nd colts player, Sateki Latu best and fairest 1st colts players. Colts Rookie of the year went to Kane Denina, Most Improved colt was Chris Riley, Rats Rat was Jeremy Allen and colts clubman was Max King.

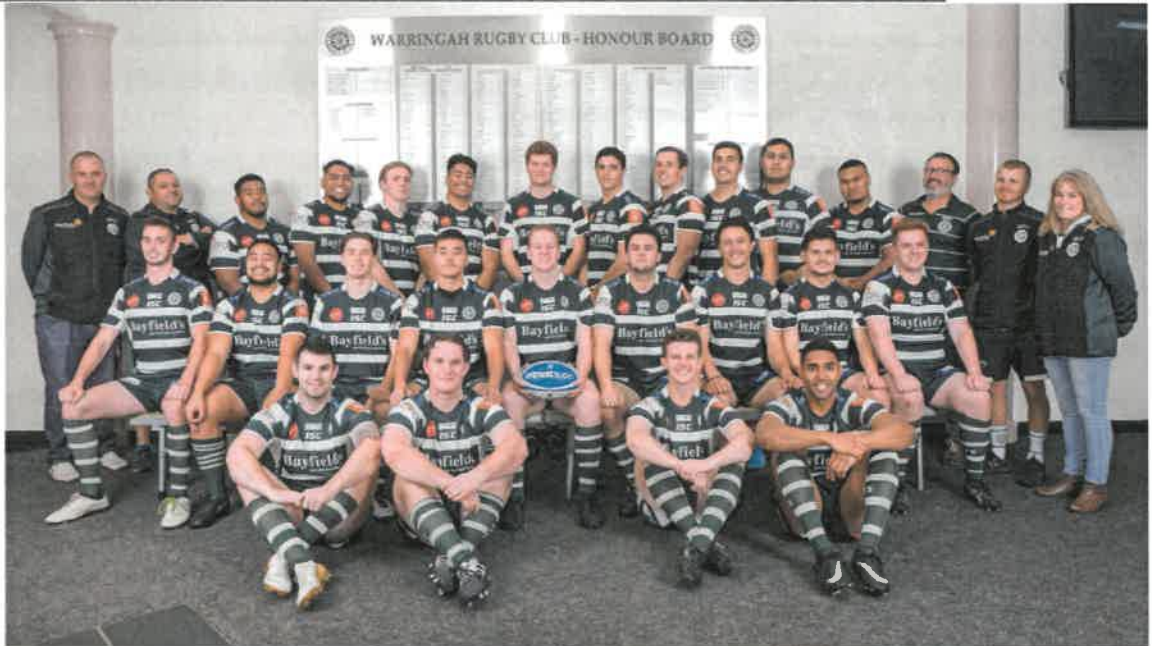

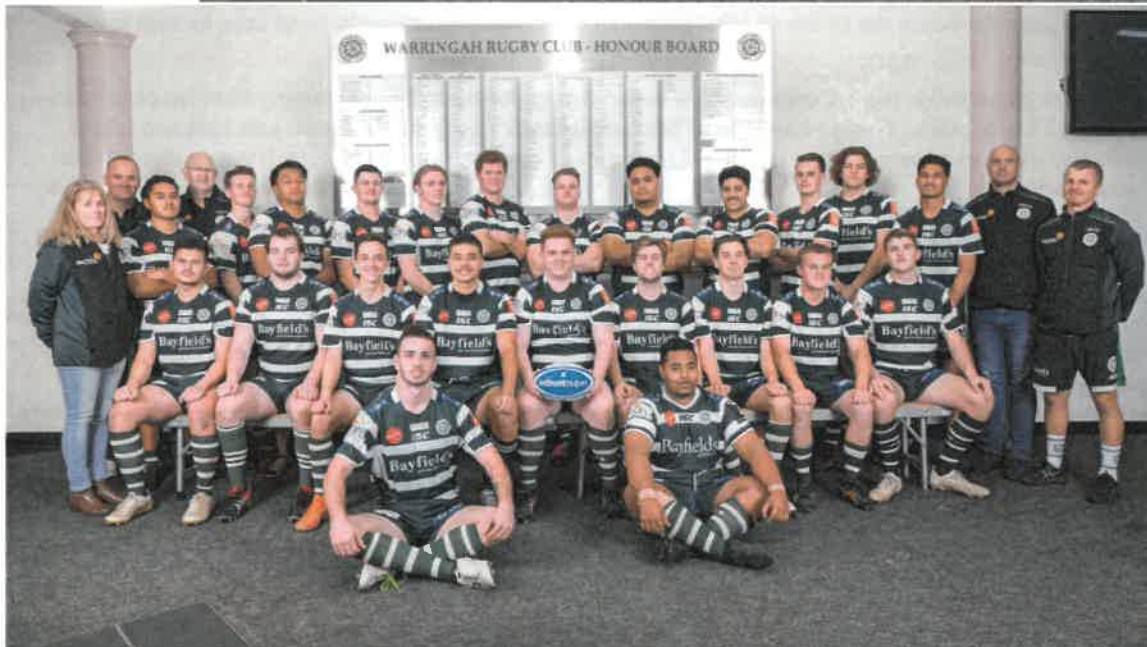

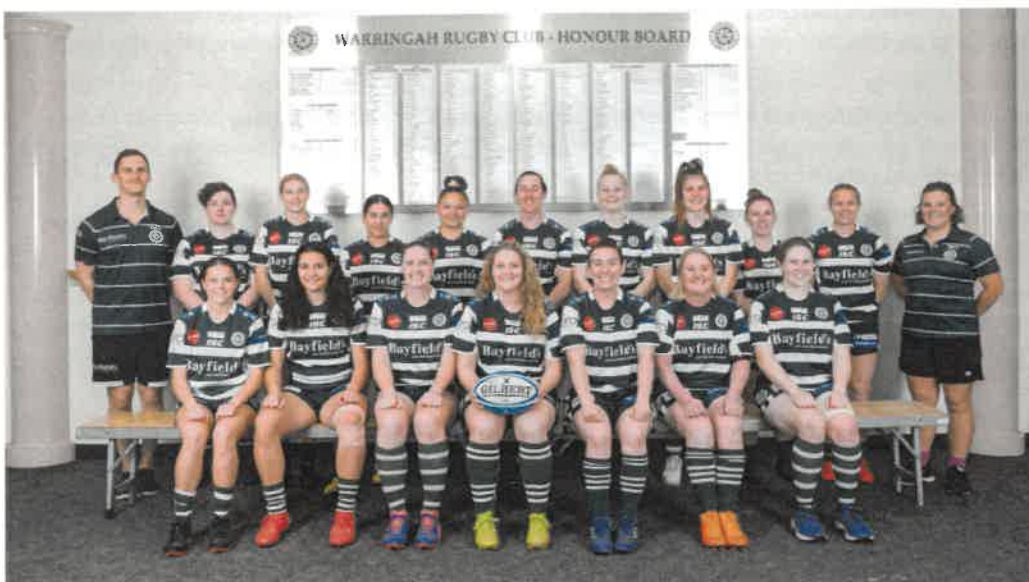

This has been my 1st year as president of WJRU and the role has provided great insights into the status of Junior rugby within Warringah. I am pleased to say that we have a great group of volunteers across the district and at all the Village clubs with everyone trying to grow the game and I would like to take the opportunity to thank all the volunteers involved in Junior Rugby across Warringah, as without you it would be very difficult to field all teams week in, week out. I am pleased to say that the number of players in Warringah in 2019 has grown slightly vs. 2018 despite numbers dropping in other districts.

Girls rugby

The Girls test program endorsed by Warringah Juniors in 2019 grew into two age groups, with 14 teams from 10 clubs (five clubs from Warringah) and more than 112 girls on the park every Saturday morning. Hosting each week at Terrey Hills Oval with regular time slots was well received. All our players are registered with their clubs via Rugby Explorer to play. The split in age groups means that our U8/U9 playing Mini Rugby and U10/U11 playing Sevens.

20 girls from three Warringah Clubs were involved in the Super W Grand Final curtain raiser at Leichhardt and a contingent ran on with the Wallaroos before the game against Japan at North Sydney Oval. We saw the standard of rugby improve through the year which should mean teams going to Sizzling and Frosty 7s as they age out of this program will be competitive.

Thank you also to Alistair Keep for helping with the set up and to the village club presidents who made themselves available to present trophies to the boys and girls.

I met with my Manly counterpart last week and our hope is that we will both be elected to our respective district's mini's coordinator roles in 2020 ensuring a continuity of the plans put in place this season to help grow the game. Reviewing player and team numbers between 2018 and 2019 I believe the mini's program has stagnated a little this year and I urge all village clubs to place a special emphasis on trying to grow their mini's player numbers in 2020.

Our Mini's rugby program has been hugely successful for many, many years and this year was no exception. I would like to take this opportunity to thank all the players, parents, spectators, referees, coaches, managers and other club volunteers who make this rugby program the success that it is.

Juniors and Sydney Junior Rugby Union (u10 – Opens)

2019 saw a more changes at SJRU with another new competition manager (2nd in 2 years), the introduction of another player registration system in Rugby Explorer and the introduction of the Match Day App for all results and team lists to be manage through, after a few minor issues in the first few rounds this seem a positive improvement. In 2020 the Rugby Explorer system will remain in place so not changes which is good for Village Clubs.

The SJRU implemented changes to the import rule across all SJRU competitions which was designed to stop player movements across clubs and districts, this created a large amount of additional administration for village clubs and the SJRU.

The reports from all Village Clubs Presidents within WJRU was that the season was a positive one with many of the village club teams competing in the finals serious at the end of the regular season. The single biggest frustration in the season for all village clubs the timeliness of publishing of the weekly draw. The frustration was both felt by clubs and parents alike and would be an area for significant improvement in 2020.

In 2019 saw the continuation of the age for weight assessments that were implemented by Rugby Australia in 2018, the feedback continues to be mixed on how this is administered and the SJRU have sought feedback from all clubs of how this is handled in the future and will be published in the 2020 Operational Guidelines.

The SJRU sought feedback from all clubs on the formation of District based teams in the competition and the WJRU voted on this and it was voted against the formation of district-based teams and this was the same direction from the SJRU member clubs. Within WJRU it was decided that we aim to field Joint Venture teams when numbers we light in age groups to field teams from Village Clubs and would be administered via the WJRU committee.

In 2019 we saw the development of a Scrum Coaching programme by Sam Needs for all Village Clubs and Representation teams, this was hugely successful and well received and a special thanks to the FOW for assisting in the funding of this activity. In addition, the FOW also raised money to fund the purchase of a scrum machine for the WJRU and this will be located at the Sydney Academy of Sport for us by all the Rep Teams and any Village clubs who require the use of scrum machine. Another amazing contribution to the development of Junior Rugby within Warringah. The ongoing support is very much appreciated.

Junior Representative Program

2019 saw the continuation of the arrangement with The Academy of Sport for a Junior Rep program to run out of The Academy at Narrabeen with the majority of the Rep teams from U10 through to U16's training at the Academy and all home trial games being hosted at the venue, providing WJRU Reps with a central home for the season. We are looking to extend this arrangement in 2020. & 2021. Discussions continue with the Rep coaches as to what is the best approach to developing and what does our Rugby programme look like for the future. A Rep Subcommittee was set up in 2019 with 2 meetings a year at this stage to discuss the pathways and the Rep Programme moving forward.

In 2019 a more inclusive approach was taken to inviting players to trial for the Junior rep teams with all club players being invited to trial in all age's groups. This increased the numbers of kids trialling for reps and in turn all improved the overall skill level across WJRU. Most of the results for Rep teams improved vs. 2018 and a special mention to the U10 Development teams who were both unbeaten at the Gala weekend on the Central Coast in July.

The highlight of the Rep season was undoubtedly the U16's Rep side who took out the State Championships held at Rat Park on the June long weekend. A massive congratulations to the coaching team and all the players involved in the amazing achievement. Something you should be very proud of and the WJRU certainly is.

Sevens State Championships

Almost 70 players and families travelled to Forster to compete in the Sevens State Championships over 3 days (Oct 18 - 20). Fielding U13, U15 and U17 Boys and Girls teams it was a weekend of firsts for the club having never previously had any Sevens or Girls teams.
